What: Press conference releasing annual State of Poverty in Ohio Report

COLUMBUS – The Ohio Association of Community Action Agencies (OACAA) in cooperation with Community Research Partners (CRP) will release its annual State of Poverty in Ohio Report on April 27, 2016, at The Ohio Statehouse Ladies Gallery. The report illustrates the effects of poverty as we try to understand how economic hardships affect Ohioans.

“Staying out of poverty is not just about making all the right decisions,” said Philip E. Cole, executive director of OACAA. “Unexpected unemployment, sudden illnesses, or a number of other circumstances can move a family from a comfortable financial position to one that is unstable.”

Utilizing graphics, data, and case studies, the State of Poverty Report will illustrate just some of the circumstances that can cause Ohioans to slip into poverty. During the press conference, Cole and CRP executive director Lynnette Cook will provide highlights of the report's findings and answer questions. Copies of the report will be available in print and online.

“Nearly half of Ohio’s households lack savings or liquid assets to keep them out of poverty under circumstance lasting longer than three months, and two-thirds of Ohioans in poverty live in suburban and rural areas of the state,” said Cole. “Poverty affects every community and this report aims to bring the issues to the forefront so we can continue making progress and help those affected.”

Community Action Agencies work to alleviate poverty and empower low-income families in their communities.
