Cordray, Husted among featured speakers at OACAA Winter Legislative Conference

COLUMBUS – The Ohio Association of Community Action Agencies (OACAA), the statewide nonprofit Community Action association, will host their annual Winter Legislative Conference at the Sheraton on Capitol Square beginning Wednesday this week. Featured Speakers include Richard Cordray (D), candidate for Ohio Governor, Jon Husted (R), Ohio Secretary of State and candidate for Ohio Lt. Governor, and Denise Harlow, Chief Executive Officer of the National Community Action Partnership. Cordray, Husted, and Harlow will speak to nearly 250 Community Action professionals from across the state who are dedicated to alleviating poverty.
